The second section of this book (Chapters 10-29) contains a series of individual wise sayings. *There is often little direct connection from one verse to the next* – they may speak of *totally different areas* of life. However, note the constant contrast between the "wise" and the "foolish"; the "righteous" and the "wicked". The righteous and the wise are those who are believers, righteous and wise by faith. The foolish and the wicked are those who are unbelievers and reflect their unbelief in foolish decisions in life.

Since Christians are Saints and Sinners at the same time, when the Holy Spirit rules in our lives we are able to reflect God's wisdom but when our sinful flesh rules in our lives we see the sin and foolishness that follows. These wise sayings are intended as instruction for believers who know the love of God in Christ and desire to better reflect God's wisdom in their lives. They are also intended as warnings to unbelievers to help them recognize their sin and folly so they will search outside themselves for an answer to the problem of sin. That answer is only found in Christ!
